

Bridgnorth branch nomination and voting are taken at branch meetings.



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

Lion O'Morfe Takes Two (AMRA Awards

"We have got our pub back", were the sentimental words of one of the Lion O'Morfe's former regulars when the pub re-opened in December 2015 after being closed for 5 years. This was the culmination of months of hard work put in by local landlord Brian Jervis and his family during the months following acquisition in the summer of 2015.

Brian, who had been running the Cider House at Wooton near Bridgnorth for 32 years, and his son Sam recall what a sorry state the pub was in. An alarming example was the outside toilet building being completely overgrown with ivy. With the added dedication of his wife Katherine, son Sam and daughters Paula and Louise, they pulled it all together in time for a grand opening in the winter of 2015 which saw the pub packed to rafters with locals and visitors alike. Further improvements to the pub came in the autumn of 2017 when a conservatory replaced the former weary structure, adding another welcome drinking area.

The pub has a main bar with an open fire and cosy wooden bench seating. To the rear is a snug with an old fashioned range lit during cold winter months.

To the left of the bar is a traditionally decorated lounge that leads to the new conservatory.



There are also outdoor toilet facilities available restored and often used by ramblers.

News of the fine selection of quality real ales being served soon became the talk of the local members of Bridgnorth CAMRA. So much so that in Autumn 2017 it received their Pub of the Season award and then a great accolade was bestowed upon the pub when it gained entry into CAMRA's national Good Beer Guide 2018 edition.



Sam recalls how surprised he was when a CAMRA member, determined to visit every new entry in the Good Beer Guide, made the long trip from Scotland to visit the pub.

This was testimony to the dedication of Sam Jervis who prides himself on every pint of the 6 real ales that are on offer, which include 2 changing beers and locally brewed regulars Enville Ale, Hobsons Town Crier, Three Tuns XXX and Sam's personal favourite Wye Valley HPA.



The Lion O'Morfe continued to thrive offering a relaxed and homely atmosphere where one can enjoy a relaxed pint of real ale in traditional surroundings without the distractions of pub music and sports television.

During the winter of 2017 the 700 strong membership of the Telford & East Shropshire branch of CAMRA voted for their favourites in their Pub of Year Award 2018 competition. The Lion O'Morfe was so successful that it ranked amongst the final six pubs to be considered for the top CAMRA branch award.

Early in 2018 CAMRA judges were appointed from neighbouring branches who visited all six finalists in towns as far apart as Market Drayton and Bridgnorth.

Unbeknown to their hosts, each pub was awarded points based on important criteria such as the pub's atmosphere, style and décor; service and welcome; sympathy with CAMRA aims; community value and, of course, the quality of its real ale, cider or perry.

The Lion O'Morfe was ranked highest place and in April 2018 Adrian Zawierka (branch chair) and Eleanor Haddon (Bridgnorth sub branch chair) presented Sam with the pub's well deserved awards of Telford & East Shropshire CAMRA Branch Pub of the Year 2018 and Bridgnorth Pub of the Year 2018 awards.



Many congratulations to the team at the Lion O'Morfe and we wish them well in the next round of CAMRA's Pub of the Year 2018 competition against pubs in

west Shropshire and Herefordshire. Let's hope that there are more celebrations to be had in the near future. Good Luck!



Pub and Brewery News

Joules

Joules are continuing to invest in their brewery. First, they have begun a local recruitment of brewery staff from the town with a view to training them to become future brewers. Also significantly they have a new yeast handling system in place that should make life a little easier for those staff as well as improving the quality of the beers.

Another bit of important news, Joule's have now completed the purchase of the red cross trademark, recognised as the 6th oldest brewery trademark and this now completes their status as independent Shropshire brewers.

They have added four new ales to their seasonal range, Frisky Rabbit was out throughout April and Royal Ale came out in May. Planning ahead they will be brewing an ale named Longshot that will be available in June and Bob On Joule's Summer ale, ready for July.

The Coracle micropub in Ironbridge

The micropub opened its doors on 31st May. There are currently 5 cask and 8 keg lines along with some boxed ciders and a small selection of quality wines. According to visitor reviews on social media, there is a wide range of perfectly kept real ales, ciders and craft beers. Snack food is also available, sourced from local suppliers. Opening hours are 12noon until 10pm every day.

Hobsons

As part of their 25th Anniversary

celebrations the brewery chartered a steam train in March on the Severn Valley Railway and stopped at the Engine Shed at Highley for lunch. Customers and suppliers enjoyed a great day out celebrating Hobsons anniversary. A limited edition beer "Mosaic & Citra" 4.2% has been brewed in collaboration with London brewpub Brew By Numbers. This powerfully hoppy unfined ale is available in cask only while stocks last.

Seasonal beers will be available as follows: June - Manor, September - Green Hop, October - Old Henry.

Hobsons Champion Mild collected silver in the Cask British Dark Beers up to 4.4% category at the Society of Independent Brewers (SIBA) beer festival held in April at Ludlow Castle, Shropshire.

Telford & East Shropshire branch of CAMRA presented their Brewery of the Year 2018 award to Hobsons (see pg 23).

The Sun Inn at Clun

The Sun Inn at Clun re- opened again on 1st May 2018. The new Landlord and Landlady are Barry Richards and Heather Teal who have been publicans in the area for many years and have a wealth of experience in the pub trade.

Seven Stars, Shrewsbury - Re-opened in May 2018, with four ales on offer.


Red Lion, Longden Common - Pub is temporarily closed for renovation work; should re-open early June.

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The Bailey Head in Oswestry

Shrewsbury & West Shropshire Branch Pub of the Year 2018

We are pleased to announce that having already taken the Market Town Pub of the Year Award, the Shrewsbury and West Shropshire Branch Pub of the Year 2018 is the Bailey Head in Oswestry.

This former Marston's pub was renamed and reopened by Duncan Barrowman and Grace Goodlad in March 2016. Although real ale is very much a part of the offering, they have created a pub that the community can enjoy. Thus they welcome customers who may just want a comfortable interlude with a soft drink. a snack, or indeed some quality time with a well behaved dog (the pub being voted Most Dog Friendly Pub in the West Midlands in 2017). A glance at the pump clips on the ceiling in the bar will reflect the effort put into providing the customer with an outstanding range of beer. Over 400 different cask beers are sold in a year.

The presentation of the Pub Of The Year award trophy coincided with a 'Meet the Brewer' and 'Tap Takeover' with Doug Macpherson of Cwrw Iâl brewery, which explains the pump clips in the photo. Also, the real ale offering is supplemented not only by three carefully chosen key cask beers, but also by extensive and exciting menus of gin, rum, vodka and whisky. The pub also provides off sales of bottled and canned beers. Our congratulations go to Grace, Duncan and the team for a well-deserved award.

The winner of the Shrewsbury Pub of the Year is the Prince of Wales. Taking the branch award for the Rural Pub of the Year was the Royal Oak at Cardington. The branch Club of the Year is the Oswestry Cricket Club and the Cider Pub of the Year is the Admiral Benbow in Shrewsbury. Well done to them all.



Reaching out to our Magnificent 706 TES (AMRA Members - Where Are You?

"Forward the real ale brigade!"
Was there a man inebriated?
Not though the drinker knew
Someone had blundered.
Theirs not to reason why,
Theirs not to score their beer,
Theirs just to drink and cheer.
Into the pubs of Shropshire.
Drank the six and seven hundred.
(With apologies to Lord Alfred Tennyson).

Every February the Telford and East Shropshire CAMRA branch nominate their selection of pubs for the forthcoming Good Beer Guide.

This is based on beer scores from CAMRA members input on to the WhatPub website.

The list of pubs, clubs and bars that score well and have a minimum of five survey returns (from five different CAMRA members) are then sent out to every member to vote for the final 25 or 26 plus 4 reserves.

Members can either do this by post or online or they can attend the selection meeting. This is where the anomalies arise and the reason for this article.

Every membership group has many passive or inactive members which is to be expected and this article is not going to change the price of fish (or beer). These members may be too busy in their daily lives, have other time-consuming interests, are not connected to the internet, find postage too expensive or are simply not interested in providing information. However, if this article connects with just a handful of inactive members out there then it will be mission accomplished.

At the selection meeting our Pub Surveys Officer, Dave Haddon, ran through his regular array of statistics as to who is

inputting scores, voting for pubs etc and these figures make for interesting reading. The proportions do not vary by very much year on year.

In our branch there were at the time of writing 340 open pubs. Only 200 of these were surveyed. Are we missing some real ale gems out there? I hope not, but you never know.



These 200 pubs received 4,372 surveys from our branch members plus another 856 surveys from members visiting from outside our branch. At first glance this looks like a lot of surveys until you realise that just 83 volunteers in our branch out of a total of 706 members input beer scores (only 11.7%). Of these 83 members, the top ten did over half of the surveys, an average of over 200 surveys per individual. If you watch other people in a bar, a considerable number will spend some time checking their phone.

So dear passive members, if this is you, once you have realised that no one has added to your Facebook or Twitter account in the last half an hour, your football team is 2-0 down yet again and you have been heavily outbid on that eBay bargain, then why not sign in to WhatPub and input a score for that wonderful/average/ropey beer that is in front of you?

More of Dave's statistics from the selection meeting followed in the vote for entries to the next Good Beer Guide. All 706 members should have a received a voting form. If you did not then contact the branch to update your contact details. 79 members out of 706 posted or emailed a return (only 11.2%). 44 members turned up at the selection meeting so assuming no overlap, a maximum 123 members in total voted out of 706 (17.4%). I believe that the pubs selected are a good choice but the voting was quite close.

One of my favourite pubs and a very popular one, particularly in the summer, missed out by a couple of votes. A few inactive members probably visited this pub in the last year and could have voted for it. I am sure that there are other similar examples. Your votes can make a difference. Is your favourite local in the GBG?

So, what is the problem then? Answers on a postcard to the editor, or maybe not as inactive members do not write to editors, neither do most active ones to be quite honest.

WhatPub is easy to use. All you need is your CAMRA membership number and a password. Scoring a beer is simple. Enter the town, find your pub and enter the date of your visit. If you know the Brewery then put it in but you don't have to. If the beer is not on the brewery list then type it in but you don't have to. Just score the beer 1 to 5. Simples (even a meerkat could do it).

I started this article with one Lord so here is another, Lord Kitchener, to point the finger.



Your CAMRA Branch really would like your beer scores all year round and your GBG votes in January/February please. Is it really asking too much? Cheers everyone.

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

Ale by Bus... Maesbury Marsh and Nesscliffe

Herefordshire CAMRA's transport correspondent and author of A Guide to Slow Travel in the Marches, Les Lumsdon, joins forces with Shrewsbury member, Harold Bound, to introduce you to a bus and ale trip through some of Shropshire's back lanes. First stop is Maesbury Marsh followed by a 2 mile canal walk to the Queen's Head and a chance to visit two more pubs on the way home.

The first leg of this escape to the countryside involves catching the 576 Arriva bus from Shrewsbury Bus Station (Stand R) at 1100 (Mondays-Saturdays) through leafy lanes to the historic settlement of Ruyton XI Towns and onward to call into the sleepy hamlets of Kinnerley and Knockin on route to Maesbury Marsh arriving just before midday.

The bus will either stop before the canal bridge or over the other side beyond the Navigation Inn.





The Navigation is a much loved pub which was at one time a warehouse on the Montgomery Canal at the Maesbury wharf serving a corn mill and a bone works both of which are closed now. The latter can be easily identified with its tall chimney. Step inside the front door and the bar is right at the very heart of this country pub which usually has on tap one Stonehouse beer. It is hard to settle down in this pub as there's a fair bit to take in: a gallery for artwork, old pews to sit on, a book exchange and in winter a wonderful log fire. There's also a small outside seating area by the canal.

When you have supped up, make your way onto the canal bridge and go left down to the towpath. Continue ahead along the Montgomery navigation for 2 miles easy walking to Queen's Head.



The canal played an important role in the late 18th century. It opened up the trade for agricultural goods, but more importantly served the limestone quarries of nearby Llanymynech from the 1790s onwards. The compacted towpath surface soon gives way to a green swathe as you dip beneath a neat brick bridge and soon you'll walk by the three Aston locks and then by an old lock keepers house. A track leads beneath the A5 to the Queens Head, another pub which thrived with the trade from the canal.





The inn gave its name to the surrounding hamlet. The small bar offers three beers on handpull, two from Stonehouse and a third from Church End Brewery, Nuneaton, all of which were in exceptional form when we visited. There are some interesting old photographic prints on the wall by the bar depicting the pub, village and canal in earlier times. There's an extensive dining area in the pub and a small patio area outside the front door which catches the sun in the afternoon.

The next hop is on the 70 bus (Oswestry to Shrewsbury) from the stop on the pub side of the road a few metres on the left (hourly at 30 mins past the hour) through to the Old Three Pigeons at Nesscliffe. It is said that this pleasant hostelry dates from the medieval period, but certainly from the 17th century. It resembles a Welsh longhouse in shape and its exterior has changed little in the past one hundred years or so.



The two last buses are 1755 and 1825 so be sure to step out in time. There's a short ride back into town which is considerably quicker than the days of the stagecoach.

The use of large blocks of red sandstone in the building from nearby quarries at Nesscliffe Edge is a distinctive feature in these parts. Needless to say the Three Pigeons associates itself with Humphrey Kynaston, Shropshire's very own highwayman who stole from the rich to serve the poor (come back Humphrey all is forgiven) and to earn a few pints of ale on the way. Like the Queens Head, the Pigeons is geared up for dining, but there's a welcoming bar serving a Stonehouse beer and changing beers from other local breweries including Salopian and Three Tuns.

If you are heading onward to the Wingfield Arms at Montford Bridge, then the buses are hourly at 40 minutes past the hour or every half hour from 1600 onwards. It is a short ride through to the Montford bus stop just after the bus crosses the River Severn. It is situated near to this old coaching house dating from a time when the old Holyhead coach would ply its way through to Oswestry.

The Wingfield serves up to four beers on tap including two from Salopian. There's a bar and lounge with a large dining room to the rear.

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The Golden Lion

Bridgnorth Pub of the Season, Spring 2018

It was with real pleasure that Chairman Eleanor Haddon presented Jon Brown, the manager of the Golden Lion with the award of Bridgnorth Pub of the Season for Spring 2018 on 23rd February.

For many years the 17th Century coaching Inn featured in the Good Beer Guide, but after the death of its long-time owner Geoff Watkins in 2015, the pub was closed and put up for sale.

Holden's Brewery stepped in and bought the

freehold, providing them with a permanent outlet in Bridgnorth. After an extensive refurbishment, the pub reopened late last year and immediately impressed visitors with the quality of beers offered. Meals are available every lunchtime, and breakfast is served on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays between 9 and 11.30. Four Holden's beers (Mild, Bitter, Golden Glow & Special) are always available as well as a guest which may be sourced from Holden's seasonal list.

With over 25 ales and ciders to sample we all "had a ball." Independently run it served the locals ales from far and wide and even had a cricket match which took place during the day.

Some used long hops whilst others would leave you stumped before you even knew it. After scoring all the samples it was decided eventually that Telekinesis, an American Pale Ale style beer, swung it as the winner. A strong ale and at 6.9% it certainly had us bowled over.

On the Saturday with the increased prospect of the weather improving, the wind dropped and the day began with openers at 12 noon. It stayed dry all day and nobody was bailed. We were able to spin it out until tea before one of the ground staff went to cut the grass.

Finally when Saturday night fell it was all over, stumps were drawn and people rolled out of the bar and the sweeping had to be done, so here is to next year. Over all, the festival was hailed a success and certainly will be run again this year so please look out for the notices with the option of camping as the organisers are really trying to make a go of it and they need your support.


